On the Other Side of Glory: Berkshire Men of the 54th Massachusetts Infantry Regiment tells the stories of the 82 men from the Upper Housatonic Valley who served in the “Glory” regiment. It provides the context necessary to help us appreciate the sacrifices the men and their families made in the pursuit of freedom and equality.

Twenty-three of the men made the ultimate sacrifice—dying during the war, in battle or from disease. The book provides an overview of the role of Berkshire men in the Civil War and a history of their recruitment for the 54th, their training, and their service in the South from 1863 to 1865. It touches on their lives before the war and also examines in detail the lives of those who returned home, in the contexts of continuing racism and discrimination in the North and the emergence of Black communities in the region. The book features 75 photos and illustrations, maps, a timeline, a full bibliography, and an index.

The 54th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry Regiment Trail honors the men from Berkshire and Litchfield counties who served in the “Glory” Regiment by directing visitors to places they lived, went to church, are remembered, and are buried.

The **African American Heritage Trail** encompasses 29 Massachusetts and Connecticut towns in the Upper Housatonic Valley National Heritage Area. The trail celebrates African Americans in the region, ordinary people of achievement and those who played pivotal roles in key national and international events—W.E.B. Du Bois, Elizabeth “Mumbet” Freeman, James Weldon Johnson, Rev. Samuel Harrison, James VanDerZee, and others.
